

# Submitting a community news article

#### How?

It's best to let us know in advance that you plan to submit a piece. That way we can advise on whether a news piece is the best way to share your story.

Email pressoffice@rsc.org with an outline of what you'd like to write about. Try to include:

- What is happening and when?
- What makes this a story that people will want to read?

Once we have agreed to cover your story, it's time to start writing!

#### Writing a great story

See our <u>online resource</u> for an example of how to structure your story. The important thing is to include the key elements explained in our <u>example story</u>, and not to overwhelm the piece with information.

*	Write too much, or you will lose your readers' attention	✓	Keep the story between 200 and 800 words. Remember short and sweet is often better	
*	Describe everything that happened in blow-by-blow detail	√ √	Pick out one or two elements to expand upon Describe the <i>impact</i> of the event/activity on yourself and others	
×	Name-drop – whether someone from history, or someone significant within the group or meeting Mention lots of names that won't mean anything to those who weren't there.	✓ ✓	When mentioning someone by name, explain who they are, however well-known they might be. If you need to name-check/thank people, consider including a photo of everyone with an appropriate caption, or a paragraph at the end saying "I would like to thank"	
×	Forget who your audience are	<b>√</b>	Our readership includes members, non- members, chemists and non-chemists. How would you make your story sound exciting to a friend who wasn't there and isn't familiar with your area?	
		✓ ✓ ✓	Include pictures Include quotes Include anything funny or unusual!	

## **Editing**

- Prepare to be edited. Whilst we will try to keep your 'voice', we may make small adjustments for style and flow.
- You will have the opportunity to approve the final copy before it's published.

### Images & video

- Please send us a few photos or a recording of your event if you can.
- If you include people's faces in photos or video, you must ask their permission and confirm to us that you have done so for everyone who is recognisable in the picture.
- Please tell us who holds the copyright for each photo. (If you took the photo, this will simply be yourself.)
- We may use your photos and video along with a full or edited version of the accompanying content – in news articles, webpage content and on social media posts.
